2016 Year in Review

Where History Comes to Life

2016 was a busy and exciting year. For the first time, the Burnaby Village Museum offered a full opening at Spring Break with free admission. A new Adventure Guide was also launched and provided visitors with an enhanced hands-on experience. *The Technology Before the Smartphone* exhibit proved to be popular among a wide range of people. The associated scavenger hunt and hands-on artifacts allowed visitors to explore more deeply how past technologies worked and were used.

Major works on the site this year included updating the main museum entry point, the Orientation Plaza, to be more welcoming and offer a better visitor experience. The Steam Shed exhibit also saw the return of the restored Waterous Steam engine.

Work continued this year on updating our school programs to meet the new BC curriculum. An Aboriginal working group was established with the Burnaby School District to provide engagement and feedback. The Museum also championed celebrating National Aboriginal Day, a first for the City of Burnaby.

Heritage Christmas saw over 50,000 visitors despite all the snow. The "Westcoast Christmas" display was a huge success that featured life size illuminated dancing ladies in a light forest of rain. Performer led sing-a-longs were also introduced this year with more than 2,000 visitors engaging with their fellow citizens through song.

A big thanks to our sponsors this year, the Royal Bank for their contribution towards school programs and for Whole Foods in assistance with baking at the Farmhouse during Heritage Christmas.

Curatorial

The unique history of Burnaby was preserved and celebrated by collecting artifacts related to the community's history, by sharing research with museum visitors, and through outreach and partnerships.

Collections Management

The Museum's collection totals over 57,838 objects, including artifacts, archival material, and special collections books.

In 2016, Museum staff worked with Information Services and an outside contractor to develop versions of the artifact and library collections databases that can be used by volunteers. The new databases will provide better access to information to the volunteers who help research and catalogue artifacts, and allow staff to review and approve all changes before they become part of the permanent record.

Work continued on a project to create library-quality catalogue records of the 4,437 books in the Museum's care. 4,106 books were catalogued by the end of 2016.

Research

In partnership with the Burnaby Public Library, a series of six Neighbourhood History lectures and two walking tours were offered featuring Museum staff and a range of speakers from Burnaby-based community groups. The lectures attracted approximately 200 attendees in total. Presentations included:

The Museum once again partnered with the Faculty of Education at Simon Fraser University to offer workshops on digital storytelling for older adults. The workshops resulted in several short digital films about important life events of Burnaby residents, several of which will be featured on the Heritage Burnaby website. Curatorial staff also participated in the steering committee for the Festival of Learning, which was co-produced by the City of Burnaby and Simon Fraser University. The Festival provided over 50 free learning opportunities throughout Burnaby from May 1 to 7. The Museum participated in several of the initiatives, including a talk on the History of Oakalla at the Shadboit Centre on May 4, an Aboriginal Medicinal Plant tour as part of RhodoFest on May 1, and a hands-on exploration of pre-digital technology at Metrotown Library on May 7.

Donations

In 2016, 766 items were catalogued. 60 donations were made, representing 518 objects that will be added to the collection.

A few highlights from items donated in 2016 include:

Merry sewing machine: made in Japan, and brought to British Columbia by Yoshino Yamamoto and her family when they emigrated to Canada in 1958.

Edison disc record player: purchased in 1915, and owned and used by three generations of the McDonald family of New Westminster and Burnaby.

Mid-century pedal car: a 1950s/1960s toy ride-in car used by a Burnaby family.

Sievenpiper collection: several documents and objects from a member of the pioneer Sievenpiper family, including Peter Sievenpiper's hand-made poster from when he ran for president of South Burnaby High School in the 1940s.

Waplington collection: artifacts and documents from the pioneer Waplington family.

George Love family bible: the family Bible of Burnaby's Love family, whose 1893 farmhouse is on display at the Burnaby Village Museum.

Burnaby Girl Guide collection: a large collection of Girl Guide material from the earliest days of guiding in Burnaby to the present. The collection includes uniforms, documents, badges, and related objects.

Conservation

In 2016 improvements were made to protect the collections storage area in the event of an earthquake. As system was designed to shut off water and alert staff to possible flooding which will be installed in 2017. Seismic bars were made to fit across storage shelves to prevent "artifact walking" during an earthquake. Acid free tissue was removed from between garments in drawers and replaced with Tyvek sheets that protect dresses from abrasion and can also act as support slings. All of the emergency supplies to protect collections were consolidated in a single location for easy access. Emergency binders were updated to better serve staff who respond to emergencies at the Museum.

At the Museum's off-site storage, conservation staff vacuumed more dusty objects and transferred them into polyethylene tubs to further protect the artifacts during storage and handling.

The fully restored and smoothly working Waterous horizontal steam engine was installed into the updated Steam Exhibit.

Artifacts for the Autoshop and Stride Studios exhibits were prepared. A very curious and fuzzy green photo album was stabilized and many strange typewriters as well.

Conservation staff continued to maintain the working artifacts and ensure that exhibits are clean and at their best for visitors.

Marketing

A series of ads and messages using a variety of media throughout the year were used to introduce and remind both locals and tourists about our Village experience.

The Museum continued to be active in Social Media, specifically Facebook, Twitter, Google+ and Instagram. In 2016, more resources were dedicated to communicating through these channels which resulted in a significant increase in our followers and engagement. Facebook: 3,062 follows to 4,644 | Twitter, 1,681 to 1,950 | Google+, 14 followers to 19 with total lifetime views 164K | Instagram, 406 to 780 followers. As more people engage online, the numbers of online reviews increase. Currently, we are reviewed on TripAdvisor (374 reviews, 4.5/5 rating), Google+ (195 reviews with a 4.5/5 rating), Yelp (29 reviews, 4.5/5 rating).

Since, going mobile friendly, our website continued to grow the number of visitors. Mobile users made up almost half our web visitors at 49% (with desktop at 36% and tablet 14%). In 2016, our web site had 255,069 (up 27,715) visits and 608,394 (up 25,116) page views. The top three most visited pages were the 'Home' page, Hours & Rates, and Heritage Christmas.

A cooperative online marketing initiative, with the Burnaby Public Libraries, highlighted a series of posts "What Am I? The initiative drew attention to the Library's 60th Anniversary, the opening of our Stride Exhibit, "Technology Before the Smart Phone" and the launch of our summer season. A series of Facebook and Twitter posts on both the Museum's and the Library's feed featured a close up image of an item that the cell phone has made redundant. Follow-up posts revealed what the item was and basic information about the 'old' technology. The call to action was to visit the Library display or the Museum to see the actual item and get more information. The Facebook posts were also translated into Chinese and Korean.

The Museum worked with two sponsors in 2016. The Royal Bank came on again as the Presenting Sponsor of our School Programs for the school year 2016/2017 and Whole Foods supported our Heritage Baking during the 2016 Heritage Christmas season. The Royal Bank's generosity allows us to offer several free school programs to designated inner city schools. The Whole Foods sponsorship included the ingredients to bake the ever popular Museum Shortbread and Ginger Sparkle cookies every Sunday during the Christmas season.

The Museum continued the previous year's Red Serge Tuesday campaign, RCMP, from the Burnaby detachment, attended in their Red Serge most Tuesdays during July and August. Promoted Facebook posts reached over 116,000 and engaged over 11,000. The campaign attracted the attention of the RCMP's signature news magazine, The Quarterly. Images and an article were submitted and printed in the September edition.

A significant summer marketing campaign, aimed at commuters, ran in July and August. Ad spaces in the Westcoast Express trains and bus stops in Coquitlam were used. The artwork evoked 'Where History Comes to Life' and the call to action was to visit the website for more information. Five more videos were added to our YouTube channel this year. These pieces highlighted upgrades to the site, exhibit upgrades, behind-the-scenes activities, and visitor experiences. The most popular piece features the return of the restored waterous steam engine.

Technology Before the Smartphone

Technology Before the Smartphone

May to September, Stride Studios exhibition gallery
The Museum's temporary exhibit gallery featured examples of communications technology from the early 1900s, including telegraph equipment, telephones, cameras, phonographs, radios, and office machines. Didactic panels explained how these technologies worked, and explored the social impact of these inventions. The display featured an interactive crank telephone that activated a telephone switchboard, and included a small display of early 1900s women's office-wear by the Canadiana Costume Society.

Smartphone Scavenger Hunt

May to September, several Village locations
Visitors were challenged to find several artifacts inside the Museum's permanent exhibits that perform functions that are now performed by a Smartphone. Examples included telephones, adding machines, and phonographs.

Hands-on Artifacts

Several hands-on artifacts related to technological change were installed in exhibition spaces for visitors to explore, including a calculating scale, stereoscope viewer, and laundry equipment.

Exhibit Upgrades

Orientation Plaza

A major upgrade to the Orientation Plaza was completed, featuring a new circulation plan that provides an improved accessible ramp, gathering spaces for large groups, and improved orientation materials.

Steam Shed

Upgrades to the Museum's working steam engine display continued. The newly restored Waterous Steam Engine was installed in the exhibit, as well as interpretive panels.



Technology Before the Smartphone exhibition

Heritage Christmas

51,755 visitors attended Heritage Christmas at the Burnaby Village Museum between November 19 and January 2.

Once again, installations of lights and lit decorations on trees and buildings were featured throughout the Village, as well as lighted eco-sculptures located throughout the site. A sound-reactive light display was again featured at the bandstand.

A popular new addition this year was the "Westcoast Christmas" display, featuring nine larger-than-life ladies dancing, provided by Parks Design staff. The "ladies" are wire frames covered in white fabric, and are lit from inside. They were decorated with umbrellas and costume accessories, and displayed beneath trees draped with 100 strands of lights that gave the appearance of rain-drops. A companion display of umbrellas was installed under the canopy of the orientation plaza, and lit with theatre lighting.

Christmas entertainment included a total of 28 performers, including Father Christmas, carolers, street musicians, and theatre performances. Home-made cookies were baked in the wood stove and shared with visitors each Sunday in the Loyal Farmhouse, sponsored by Whole Foods. New this year, Christmas sing-a-longs were added to the schedule. The sing-a-longs were led by costumed performers, and were enjoyed by the more than 2,000 visitors who participated in the sing-a-longs.

The 12 Days of Christmas scavenger hunt returned for another season. The hunt was refreshed with several clues from previous years replaced with new ones.

Vintage decorations in the Village and traditional Christmas greens rounded out the decorations. The Canadiana Costume Society again provided a costume display at Elworth House featuring a late 1800s gown and trousseau for a winter wedding. Vintage radios were located in several of the heritage buildings, featuring Christmas music from the early 20th century.

Programming

Special Events

For the first time ever, Burnaby hosted a community-based National Aboriginal Day celebration in 2016. Burnaby Village Museum staff took an active role on the planning committee and provided programming on the day of the event, held at Edmonds Community School. Many of our special events on BC Day celebration, we welcomed over 2,000 visitors, almost doubling attendance over the year prior. The day was jam packed with activities and displays. Burnaby Amateur Radio Club was on hand providing an opportunity for visitors to read and send Morse code—the original text message. Young visitors loved the opportunity to try juggling, plate spinning and tight wire walking activities provided by Vancouver Circus School. Finally, for our Haunted Village opening in 2016, we added a fourth night to the schedule with great results. Three out of the four nights saw over 1,200 visitors through the front gates in only a 3 hour window.

Summer Season

Our goal for the Summer Season was to create more opportunities for hands-on, experiential exploration at the Village. Visitors enjoyed the aroma of coffee beans being ground in our antique grinder, used old-fashioned stereoscopes to take a virtual sightseeing trip abroad, and participated in laundry chores the hard way—using a scrub board and ringer to wash clothes. We also created a scavenger hunt that tied into our summer technology theme. Mocked up to look like a smart phone, the scavenger hunt card tasked kids with finding the analog technology behind each modern app. Many of our regular partners rounded out our program offerings, including Tsiel-Waututh Naiton's Takaya Tours, Pacific Spirit Quilters Guild, and Burnaby Arts Council's Summer Theatre troupe. They were joined by Burnaby Public Library staff who came on site every week in July and August with their pop-up library. Visitors could peruse a selection of technology-themed kids' books and sign them out on the spot.

Spring Break

In 2016, Burnaby Village Museum debuted a new format for our Spring Break opening. We made it free to the public for the very first time, extended our opening hours, and staffed every regular exhibit. We also debuted our Adventure Guide. Young visitors who purchased the booklet used it to engage in special activities throughout the Village, such as cashing a cheque at the Royal Bank and spending their "Burnaby Buck" at the General Store. The public response was overwhelming—we sold hundreds of booklets and nearly tripled our attendance numbers over the previous year.

Aboriginal Enhancement Teacher Meagan Innes and Head Teachers Teresa Migliori and Juliana Cipparrone have provided invaluable feedback about how we can modify our programs to meet the new curriculum's emphasis on First Nations content and reflective thinking.

Volunteers & Staff

In 2016, our in-house experts covered diverse topics at this monthly opportunity for professional development, from a fashion history of hats to restoration efforts at Love Farmhouse to a tour of our gardens. And finally, our Programming staff have been active representing Cultural Services on the City of Burnaby Volunteer Committee, assisting in the standardization of volunteer management policies and best practices.


